


The National Guard and ECHD Vax the Community

The Edgecombe County Health Department (ECHD) and the National Guard have been working together during the pandemic to provide COVID-19 vaccinations to the community. The partnership has been an instrumental part in getting vaccines in arms of people who need it most. They have helped enter information into COVID-19 Vaccine Management System (CVMS) and administer vaccines at the ECHD clinics in both Tarboro and Rocky Mount since January. Now, the National Guard and the ECHD are taking an aggressive approach to vaccinating by scheduling pop-up events throughout the county. These events are in areas with low vaccination numbers and are held in a variety of settings including churches, work places and housing developments. The orders for the National Guard will be over at the end of August and the ECHD is truly grateful for the time, energy, and flexibility all of their staff has given during the response.




Youth Vaping/Tobacco Cessation Efforts





CATCH this...

In May 2021, the Halifax County Health Department utilized CATCH (Coordinated Approach to Child Health) grant funds to serve a total of 4,699 students in pre-k, elementary and middle schools at Roanoke Rapids Graded School District, Halifax County Schools, Weldon City Schools, and KIPP Schools. Each student enrolled at the schools received an age appropriate ball to take home to encourage physical activity while away from school. In addition to the individual balls, each school was donated a CATCH equipment set that consists of various physical education items which includes assorted balls, jump ropes, and hula hoops. These sets will provide opportunities for students to practice and participate in physical education at their schools and at their homes.

CATCH is an evidence-based, coordinated school and afterschool health program that promotes physical activity, healthy food choices, and tobacco avoidance for children in pre-K through 8th grade.

Also, please see attached pictures that correspond with the event. Health Department staff, along with the National Guardsmen who were assigned to our agency worked really diligently to get this project completed.





Grilled Peach Sundae Recipe

When you're grilling this summer don't forget the peaches! Try this simple recipe for a cool grilled dessert.

A delicious way to use in-season peaches.

You could simply eat the grilled peaches on their own. Or you could make it a special treat and add a scoop of frozen yogurt or sorbet to make a peach sundae.



Servings: 2

Ingredient List

2 peaches, halved and pitted

1 tsp canola oil

2 scoops of nonfat vanilla frozen yogurt or fruit sorbet

1 Tbsp toasted unsweetened coconut

Instructions

Preheat grill to high.

Brush peach halves with oil.

Grill until tender.

Place 2 peach halves in each bowl and top with a scoop of frozen yogurt (or sorbet) and coconut.

What is the Northeastern North Carolina Partner-ship for Public Health?

The Northeastern North Carolina Partnership for Public Health (NCNCPPH) is a partnership of health departments in Northeastern NC which have come together with support from the Division of Public Health, East Carolina University, and the NC Institute of Public Health at UNC Chapel Hill, to collectively address the community's health by sharing best practices and resources. Currently the NENCPPH represents seven health departments and sixteen counties.
